Young people like to go online and use iphones to email, chat, watch videos, send messages, play games and do homework. But sometimes the language they use with each other can be mean or rude. It's important for young people to appreciate that their words can cause unintentional harm, whether used online or in person.

And that's really the difference between "kids being kids" and cyberbullying: intention. Sometimes meanness is accidental, but, when people use digital tools such as the internet or text messages to deliberately upset someone else over and over, that's cyberbullying.

No matter what, if someone says or does something that makes your child feel bad, they should tell a trusted adult. If your child hurts a peer, they should apologise and

IT'S OUR SCHOOL MOTTO! SO, WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO ACT JUSTLY?

Everyone likes to be treated fairly. We all value equality, fairness, justness and rightness; but at times, life isn't fair! Hard workers can lose their jobs; drunk or careless drivers at times kill innocent people; powerful people and organisations can manipulate the system to get what they want. What should our response be in the face of such

widespread injustice? How do we seek justice? In the Old Testament, the Prophet Micah provides us with an answer: "He has shown you, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To <u>act justly</u> and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6: 8)

Only God is perfectly just and our desire for justice comes from Him. Justice is not merely about defending personal rights and condemning social evils. Biblical justice starts in the heart. It is inseparable from love and humility. This verse explains what God expects of a person who seeks Him. God requires three ongoing actions from us: Act justly. Love mercy. Walk humbly with our God.

1. ACT JUSTLY: (Our School Motto!)

Acting Justly means making fair decisions in our lives. James instructs us not to show favouritism to beautiful, important, or rich people (James 2:1-13). Do I show more courtesy to a well-dressed business person than I do to a homeless person or someone who appears less fortunate? God stamped His image on every human being and that gives each and every person great dignity. The Bible provides our moral standard; it defines right and wrong. The words and actions of a person of integrity align with God's truth. He or she does what is right even when no one is watching; even when it takes more time or costs more money. Acting justly requires action, not mere talk. Biblical justice is never divorced from acts of love and mercy. In this Year of Mercy my we all grow as a school community in practicing acts of kindness and showing Mercy.

2. LOVE MERCY: (This year is the Year of Mercy!)

Everyone likes to escape the negative consequences of wrong behaviour. Whether a sigh of relief or the thrill of a narrow escape, averting punishment feels good. But is that mercy? Mercy doesn't mean letting injustice prevail. Paul tells us that "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). God's mercy for us cost Jesus His life. Jesus took the penalty and punishment that we deserved.

Mercy will cost us comfort and time. It will cost us money and status. And it will give us heartache. As a follower of Jesus, the command to love mercy reveals my heart. Too often I love justice and am rather miserly with mercy. My skewed idea of justice lets me demand my rights, but makes other people face the consequences of their actions. At times we can find ourselves living the exact opposite of God's desire, which is why humility is so important.

3. WALK HUMBLY WITH GOD (Great advice from the Prophet Micah!)

Though the world tries to tell me otherwise, I didn't make myself. God created all things, including me. When I acknowledge that everything I am and have comes from God, I understand His authority to lead me and I discover my need to surrender again. God created all people in His image. Intelligence, beauty, and physical ability all come from Him. So, no person is worth more than another person. I walk humbly with God by valuing each life and respecting all people. As well, God entrusted the care of the earth to people. Seeing ourselves as stewards; not owners, keeps us from exploiting the world for our profit. Protecting earth's beauty and carefully managing its resources are ways to walk humbly with God.

ACTING JUSTLY in action: On Saturday 10th September St. John's Dapto held their annual SPRING FAIR and we had 17 students from Joeys volunteer to help out on the day. What great examples they are to all of us in living out our school motto.
