# Year 9 Imagine

Imagine 2014 is the result of a five-year partnership between the Catholic Education Office Diocese of Wollongong and a number of tertiary institutions in Wollongong and Sydney and is largely the vision of Professor Joseph Ciarocchi, a Psychology Lecturer at ACU, who is passionate about developing emotional intelligence and leadership skills in young people. Alongside Mrs Gail Tarrant, an Education Officer; Pastoral Care Religious Education and Learning Services at the Catholic Education Office *Lara Alfiero, James Connelly, Sophie Edwards and Joshua Liaropoulos* were the selected students representing St. Joseph's for the Imagine initiative this year.

The Imagine initiative brought together 32 Year 9 students from Diocesan schools for a workshop in August, where the students were guided in a number of activities around effectively managing emotions, voicing opinions appropriately, identifying goals, building respectful relationships, using personal strengths and developing resilience. After the workshop the students were empowered and challenged to return to school and positively influence the St Joseph's community. Upon returning our student leaders spent many weeks brainstorming ideas, planning, creating and implementing a pastoral initiative around the theme of wellbeing, specifically, random acts of kindness, with the ultimate aim of improving mental health within our school communities. The year 9 students identified the Year 11 students as a group of students in our community who needed a boost and so they decided to create a prayer card which detailed personal hand written positive affirmations and well wishes for the Year 11 students who are about to embark on their final year of secondary education. The prayer cards were written by each year 9 student with the intention of being an anonymous random act of kindness. The year 11 students received their cards in homeroom last week. Year 9 students hope that our senior students received a boost of energy and increased self esteem and that after reading their personal message feel loved, supported and valued here at St Joseph's. The year 9 students felt empowered and received a great sense of enjoyment and satisfaction knowing they will have made someone's day a little brighter.

In the words of Princess Diana "Carry out a random act of kindness, with no expectation of reward, safe in the knowledge that one day someone might do the same for you."

The Year 9 students came away from this experience with a wealth of knowledge in relation to adolescent issues and are planning to continue with this theme each year focussing on random Acts of Kindness during Mental Health Month.



# CHANGES TO THE SECONDARY SCHOOLS TAX FILE NUMBER PROGRAM IN 2015

The Secondary Schools Tax File Number (TFN) Program will not continue beyond 31 December 2014. This means that School TFN forms will no longer be processed beyond this date. **How students can apply for a TFN from 1 January 2015** The Australian Taxation Office in partnership with Australia Post is making it easier for individuals to apply for a TFN. Students can now apply for a TFN online and have their identity verified through an interview at a participating Australia Post office.

Applying online is the fastest and most convenient way for students to get a TFN. More information on applying online can be found at ato.gov.au by searching for 'QC27248' Students who are unable to visit a participating Australia Post office will need to complete the Tax file number - application form or enquiry for individuals form (NAT 1432). This TJHC was established at the commencement of the Royal Commission to:

- Speak for the Church in matters related to the Commission and child sexual abuse;
- Coordinate the Church's legal representation at the Commission;
- Identify systemic institutional failures that have impeded the protection of children; and
- Indicate to the Commission the procedures that have been put in place over the past 20 years.

Building parent-school partnerships

# Are you amongst the 10% of smart parents?

Parenting is challenging but you don't need to go it alone. We all need help from time to time. Here are some ideas to help parents build their support network.

New Queensland research revealed that half of parents struggle with the stress of raising children, but only 10 per cent regularly ask for help. They are the smart 10 per cent!

Parents need assistance, advice and support from others to help them successfully raise their kids. Yet, 90 per cent of them do not regularly ask for help.

My experience suggests this is an Australiawide phenomenon.

# Help-seeking behaviours are healthy

Traditionally, Australians have not been great at asking for help of any kind. The term 'battler' is an endearing term attributed to someone who is doing it tough.

But for every battler who has fought against the odds and succeeded there are at least ten who struggled alone and never really got anywhere. And their families suffered as a result.

### Fear of judgment

Anecdotal evidence suggests that many parents don't seek help through fear of being judged as poor parents. Of course, the reality is that ALL parents struggle from time to time coping with their children's behaviours and attitude. We can all use some help, as it's easy to get STUCK in your parenting.

Help comes in many forms. It's essential to build your network of support. Here's how:

# Start with family and friends

You need between three and five trusted, non-judgemental people who you can call on for help. Count how many you have right now. If you fall short, look for ways to build your social capital.

# Work alongside your child's teacher

Develop an open and communicative relationship with your child's teacher so that you can work with them, seek support and develop ongoing strategies. Understand the best time to touch base with your teacher and establish how regularly this contact is needed.

# 3 Find counselling, parent education services and professional assistance

Whether paid or free (such as Parentline), there are various services that you can go to when you need significant assistance. Foster a relationship with a professional (general practitioner, psychologist, specialist in a child's disorder, social worker) that you can trust and return to over time.

# 4 Follow a voice you can trust

Part of modern parental stress comes from the plethora of information about raising kids. Answering the basic question, "Am I doing a good job?" is now super-confusing. Choose expertise wisely.

### **6** Don't blaze trails

Many parents think like the Lone Ranger, they are blazing a trail through uncharted territory. Raising twins on your own? You're not the first. Got a child with ADHD, another with autism and your 15 year old wants to get a tattoo? You're not the first. Seek out likeminded parents or experienced professionals who have been down these paths, or have helped people navigate similar situations and get their perspectives. Trail-blazers are easily lost.

If you are like the majority of parents who find the job tough from time to time then I encourage you to be one of the smart 10 per cent and adopt help-seeking behaviours. The alternative, struggle along with the majority of parents, is just not necessary.
