Dear Parents, Students, Staff and Friends of St Joseph's Community,

Pentecost Sunday 8th June, 2014

Jesus did not abandon his apostles, even when departing from this world (on the Feast of the Ascension) to return to his Father in heaven. Ten days later, at Pentecost, one of his most significant promises-the promise to send the Holy Spirit in abundance on them-was extraordinarily realised.

After Pentecost the Apostles were never again the same.

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit impacted dramatically on their convictions and on their enthusiasm to carry out Jesus' wishes. The effects were immediately noticeable to the watching and listening crowds.

The Apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit and given the gift of speech. As they spoke, their listeners-many of whom were foreigners-could hear and understand them in their own languages. The Apostles now acted as members of a united and committed community. Although Christ had established the Church while still on earth, at Pentecost it became manifest in the world for the first time. It became obvious that God was working powerfully through the Church.

At Pentecost the Church earnestly began its mission to the whole world. The mission centres on preaching about the saving name of Jesus and about the wonders of God. God's greatest wonder is that, through the suffering and death of Jesus the Messiah, people are saved from the consequences of their sins: alienation from God.

The feast of Pentecost celebrates a promise realised. It acknowledges that the Holy Spirit is at the heart of the Church's life. Because that is so, the Church cannot ultimately fail in its task of witnessing to Jesus' death and resurrection. It will eventually succeed in communicating the message of God's salvation to everyone in the world.

The Feast of Pentecost is a wonderful celebration of the missionary Church. Let us reflect on our missionary efforts in our homes, schools and workplaces. How are we willing to demonstrate that we are serious about our confirmation (Pentecost) responsibilities? In what ways do we explain the authentic teaching of the Church? How do we experience Pentecost as a promise realised in our lives, leading us to make the urgency of the gospel message of salvation a reality for everyone we meet? As we approach the true middle of year time, thoughts turn to student reports. The Michael Grose article attached to this week's newsletter explores this, what can be, a challenging event for many families. He encourages parents to check their expectations, be careful of their children's self esteem and broaden their focus away from academic achievements. This is a great article and well worth a read. I've also included some more information on particular social media sites our children tend to be drawn into. Educating yourself on the details of these sites is a powerful tool.

TUMBLR is like a cross between a blog and Twitter: It's a streaming scrapbook of text, photos and/or videos and audio clips. Users create and follow short blogs or "tumblelogs" that can be seen by anyone online (if made public).

Why it's popular? Many teens have tumblrs for personal use –sharing photos, videos, musings and things they find funny with their friends. Tumblelogs with funny memes and gifs often go viral online as well. **What parents need to know!**

- **Porn is easy to find.** This online hangout is hip and creative but sometimes raunchy. Pornographic images and videos, depictions of violence, self-harm, drug use and offensive language are easily searchable.
- Privacy can be guarded, but only through an awkward workaround. The first profile a member
 creates is public and viewable by anyone on the Internet. Members who desire full privacy have to
 create a second profile, which they're able to password protect.
- **Posts are often copied and shared.** Reblogging on Tumblr is similar to re-tweeting. A post that's reblogged from one tumblelog then appears on another. Many teens like, and in fact want their poses reblogged. But do you really want your kids' words and photos on someone else's page?



Google+ is Google's social network, which is now open to teens. It has attempted to improve on Facebook's friend concept, using 'circles' that give users more control about what they share with whom.

Why it's popular – Teens aren't wild about Google+ yet. But many feel that their parents are more accepting of it because they associate it with schoolwork. One popular aspect of Google+ is the addition of real-time video chats in Hangouts (virtual gatherings with approved friends).

What parents need to know!

Teens can limit who sees certain posts by using "circles".

Friends, acquaintances and the general public can all be placed in different circles. If you're friends with your child on Google+, know that you may be in a different "circle" than their friends and therefore seeing different information.

- Google+ takes teens' safety seriously. Google+ created age-appropriate privacy default settings for any users whose registration information shows them to be teens. It also automatically reminds them about who may be seeing their posts if they're posting on public or extended circles.
- Data tracking and targeting are concerns. Google+ activity (what you post and search for and who you connect with) is shared across Google services including Gmail and YouTube. This information is used for targeting ads to the user. Users can't opt out of this type of sharing across Google services.

Vine is a social media app that lets users post and watch looping six-second video clips. This Twitter-owned service has developed a unique community of people who post videos that are often creative and funny and sometimes thought provoking.

Why it's popular! Videos run the gamut from stop motion clips of puzzles doing and undoing themselves to six-second skits showing how a teen wakes up on a school day vs. a day during summer. Teens usually use Vine to create and share silly videos of themselves and/or their friends and family.

What parents need to know!

It's full of inappropriate videos! In three minutes of random searching, we came across a clip full of full-frontal male nudity, a woman in a fishnet shirt with her breats exposed, and people blowing marijuana smoke into each other's mouths. There's a lot of funny, clever expression on Vine, but much of it isn't appropriate for students.

- There are significant privacy concerns. The videos you post, the accounts you follow and the comments you make on videos are all public by default. But you can adjust your settings to protect your posts; only followers will see them and you have to approve new followers.
- Parents can be star performers (without knowing). If your teens film you being goofy or silly, you may want to talk about whether they plan to share it.

Building parent-school partnerships

Reading your child's report

Reports can mean anxious times for children. Will my parents be disappointed or proud? This is the main concern of most children.

Could try harder... always does her best...lacks concentration... easily distracted... a pleasure to teach... Do these comments, taken from a batch of student reports sound familiar?

Student reports bring mixed feelings for parents. Pleasure and pride if they are performing well but considerable angst when children are not progressing as you hoped.

Reports can mean anxious times for children too. Will my parents be disappointed or proud? This is the main concern of most children. Kids of all ages take their cues from their parents, so your reaction to their school report can affect the way they see themselves as learners and as people.

Before you rip open the sealed envelope containing the report do a little self-check to see if you are in the right frame of mind:

1 Are your expectations for your son or daughter realistic and in line with their ability?

Expectations are tricky. If they are too high then kids can be turned off learning. Too low and there is nothing to strive for. Pitch your expectations in line with your child's abilities. A quick check of your child's last report cards may provide you with a good yardstick.

2 Do you believe that children learn at different rates?

There are slow bloomers, late developers and steady-as-you-go kids in every classroom, so avoid comparing your child to siblings, your friends' children and even yourself when you were a child. Instead look for individual progress.

3 Are you willing to safeguard your child's self-esteem rather than deflate it?

Self-confidence is a pre-requisite for learning, so be prepared to be as positive and encouraging as possible. School reports come in different formats. Some are prescriptive while some use grading systems such as A, B, C, etc. with room for teacher comments. Regardless of the format school reports should provide you with an idea of your child's progress in all subject areas, their attitude and social development.

Here are some ideas to consider when you open your child's report:

Focus on strengths Do you look for strengths or weaknesses first? The challenge is to focus on strengths even if they are not in the traditional 3Rs or core subjects.

Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort is below standard, then you have something to work on. If your child is putting

in the required effort, then you cannot ask any more than that, regardless of the grading.

Broaden your focus away from academic performance to form a picture of your child's progress as a member of a social setting. How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence his happiness and well-being, as well as give an indicator to his future. The skills of independence and co-operation are highly valued by employers so don't dismiss these as unimportant.

Take note of student self-assessment

Kids are generally very honest and will give a realistic assessment of their progress. They are generally very perceptive so take note of their opinions.

Discuss the report with your son or daughter talking about strengths first before looking at areas that need improvement. Ask for their opinion about how they performed and discuss their concerns.

After reports are read and discussed celebrate your child's efforts with a special activity or treat. In this way you will recognise progress and remind them that the holidays are just around the corner when they can forget about assessment, tests and reports for a while.
